TMMS Science Students Receive \$10K Grant to Study Bioremediation in Bridgeport

TMMS sixth and seventh grade science classes have been awarded a \$10,000 Toyota Tapestry Grant provided through a partnership between Toyota Motor Sales the National Science Teachers' Association.

The grant offers K–12 science teachers the opportunity to develop innovative projects to enhance science education in the school and/or district and will fund a sixth and seventh grade environmental research investigation into Bridgeport brownfield sites and bioremediation during the 2011-12 academic year.

The sites, mainly factories that have been closed and are now abandoned, house petroleum wastes that leak above and below ground.

The 2009 Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection's list of Petroleum Contaminated or Potentially Contaminated Sites lists 35 pages of leaks and spills in Bridgeport.

Through the grant, students will be encouraged to investigate and evaluate existing clean up processes and perhaps develop a more creative, environmentally responsible and inexpensive clean up solutions for petroleum spills.

The grant includes a field trip to the Connecticut Science Center to view the Plant Earth exhibit and to explore a hands-on soil investigation.

Through research, experimentation and data analysis from the oyster mushroom soil remediation investigation, students will create an informative video that can be shared with a broad audience to inspire the greater Bridgeport communities, as well as local and state governments, to expand methods of bioremediation for petroleum-contaminated soils.

Thor the movie is so good because there's a nice balance between action, drama and humor. Fights aren't thrown into the story line for no reason, and, unlike a certain arachnid superhero, Thor doesn't start angsting, until he has something to angst about.

The story starts off simple enough. After nearly starting a war with the Frost Giants by leading a reckless attack, Thor (played by Chris Hemsworth) is banished to the human world by his father Odin, and stripped of his magical war hammer, the source of his power. The movie follows him as he attempts to recover his powers, with assistance from Jane Foster (played by Natalie Portman) a scientist studying wormholes.

The ensuing story is very interesting, the characters are consistent, and the relationships all make sense. Although I'm not an expert on Norse mythology, they movie doesn't stray too far from it, and what inconsistencies there are with mythology can easily be attributed to the fact that the "Gods" of Asgard have passed into human legend. This means that the stories would obviously be corrupted by time and oral storytelling. It's actually quite brilliant.

Portman excels in her role, as does Hemsworth and the rest of the characters.

There are some problems with the film. The most obvious is the Frost Giants. It's not that they are poorly developed characters; it's that they simply aren't developed enough.

The Frost Giants are only developed through vague hints in the dialogue, which would have been sufficient if they only appeared briefly, but they are extremely important to the plot. Just one additional scene about them would have helped immensely, but we never get a chance to see more than their war councils.

Another issue that occasionally arises is that some of the fight scenes are a bit confusing when watching them for the first time. Watching the scenes a second time helps understand what's happening, but some of the fighting is far too flashy and hard to follow.

Despite these issues, the movie manages to tell an entertaining story that successfully captured my interest far more than most superhero movies.

I give the movie a 9.5 out of 10.
